my time! You are just a donkey to think you could go anywhere in school or in life", she said. Ain't tenure great?



However, during her talk, Cathy noted that technically she was not an Ambassadorial Scholar. According to Jim Johnson, on Page One of the Santa Rosarian, their paths first crossed in the Mesolithic era when Cathy was returning from her stint in Kent, England, as a Rotary Journalism Scholar and Graham was outbound to Queen's University in Belfast, Northern Ireland, as an Ambassadorial Scholar. Is it ironic that last week's bulletin incorrectly reported information about the PD Editor?

The Rotary Ambassadorial Scholarship is a privately-funded scholarship founded in 1947 to further international understanding and friendly relations among people of different countries. Since its inception, over \$16.2 million has been given to such students, awarded to graduate students pursuing studies in areas of peace, understanding, health or poverty. Both Cathy and Graham were goodwill ambassadors abroad and shared with us their experiences abroad in England and Northern Ireland.

They both spoke passionately about the importance of such scholarships on bringing peace and understanding around the world, and still keep in touch with many of their acquaintances from abroad. Both expressed great gratitude to our Rotary Club for having been given such prestigious scholarships and amazing opportunities to grow and learn.

When **Debi Zaft** was Rotary president 2006-07, she closed every meeting with a quote from Honoring our Past: The Words & Wisdom of Paul Harris. In August 1926, he said "Let us keep our hearts strong, enthusiasm fresh, hope high. As long as we keep imbued with this spirit, Rotary can never die."
