


Our Program For June 22nd:

THE PROGRAM

Often, even as Rotarians, we are not fully aware of all the ways the thousands of dollars collected from dues, fundraisers, fines and donations are used to help the world community and those who need our help. In his on-going efforts to educate and encourage more of our admirable fund-raising behavior, **President Don** used his last Club Assembly to show where our money has been spent this year and, more importantly, to illustrate the good that was done by our club locally and internationally.

President Don listed our club's many local projects. He described our contributions to the community through generous donations to the Dictionary Project, the Nutcracker Children's Christmas Party, the poinsettia project for seniors living at Vigil Light, and the various hands-on projects that involved so many members of our club this year. The welcome leadership of some of our newer Rotarians through these four sweat-equity projects

was recognized by Don and our entire Rotary Club.

WORLD COMMUNITY SERVICE

President Don was at the forefront of helping our club expand our emphasis on World Community Service. With a budget of \$10,000, the WCS Committee found a number of ways for our club to help. Committee chair **Tony Roehrick** shared with the club the world projects funded this year:

- \$1,500 donated to a Rwanda School Project—our part of a \$24,000 matching grant that funded new bathrooms, a water catchment system and the muchneeded repair of a solar panel system.
- \$2,000 to purchase two Shelter Boxes used to provide immediate shelter in disaster distant locations.
- \$1,000 for the Adopt a Village project, part of a matching grant with Sebastopol Rotary Club.
- \$4,500 to fund Project Amigo, our club's new "Anchor Project" that will be funded annually over a period of several years. Our resident Project Amigo expert, Past President (2002-03) Will Haymaker, reminded us that public school in Mexico is only free through the sixth grade. The money donated by our club will be used to provide scholarships for five elementary school children, four junior high and four high school students in the children in Colima, Mexico. Will announced also that there will be a Rotary Work Week in Colima March 3-11, 2012 for those Rotarians interested in the "hands on" experience.

THE CHILDREN OF DERBENT

Last—but not least—World Community Service Chair **Tony Roehrick** asked **Jim & Bergen Johnson** to tell us about our club's newest and smallest international project. Earlier this year, the Rotary Club of Santa Rosa was asked

village in Bergen's native country of Turkey. In that village of Derbent, we learned, one out of every five babies are born with webbed fingers and webbed toes, due a genetic anomaly called Syndactly, that began more than a century ago due to isolation, poverty, and a restricted gene pool. Upon the recommendation of the World Community Service Committee, our board of directors approved an initial contribution of \$1,000 for a pilot project. As **President Don** remarked later, "When Jim and Bergen brought this project to us, it touched our hearts."

Fellow Rotarian and retired orthopedic surgeon, **Dr. Creed Wood**, who serves on the committee volunteered to research the project and talked to the Turkish physicians who had discovered Syndactly and, in 2003, developed the corrective surgery for this deformity that caused the children to be outcasts in their own community. Coincidentally, the lead surgeon, Dr. Ilhimi Kuru, had contacted Bergen on Wednesday morning to tell her that they had completed the two operations on the child we had sponsored—a six-year-old boy named Oktay Koksoy—and he was recovering at home. He invited Bergen to join him in Derbent to meet Oktay and the other children in August when she is in Turkey.

SILENT (no, really!) ROTARIAN OF THE YEAR

To conclude Don's final club assembly, our president recognized **Jim Johnson** for all his work behind the scenes over the past 31 years, especially for his contributions during President Don's presidential year with little recognition. Don named Jim *Silent Rotarian* of the Year.

In addition to serving as Club Historian and his dedication to our new Turkish community service project, every week Jim does the final edit on the draft of meeting notes taken by Bulletin Committee members and, along with several other volunteers, checks for grammar, spelling, punctuation, and other typographical errors. Jim has served on the Public Safety Awards committee and the club's program committee for the past 15 years, often as chair. Also he has been responsible for

researching and writing the paragraph that describes next week's program on our bulletin's cover page, putting his experience in radio & television to work. Great work this year, Jim. Have fun editing this bulletin!
