Robin shared with us the sad history of genocide in Rwanda and the changes she has seen in her recent years of visiting, living and working there. Although water systems are improving and fiber optic cable is being installed, there are great needs to provide for secondary educations.

Robin described the growth of the school we have

Robin ended her presentation by describing four specific students. It was touching to learn from her that her fourth example, a bright young man by the name of Alex, was being re-united this very week with his mother after believing for 17 years that she had been killed shortly after his birth.
