

# SAN FRANCISCO' OLDEST & HEAVIEST MUSICAL TREASURE

CENTURY-OLD PIPE ORGAN FROM SAN FRANCISCO'S PANAMA-PACIFIC EXPOSITION

Flamingo Resort Hotel, Wednesday, 12:00 noon



The seventh largest pipe organ in the world was given to the City of San Francisco after serenading thousands at the Panama-Pacific Exposition 96 years ago. Housed in the Civic Auditorium—built specifically to house the huge theatrical organ—the Exposition's gift was damaged in the infamous 1989 "World Series" Earthquake and it was removed and repaired. Sadly, the treasured gift has never been re-installed in the Civic Auditorium or played again. Hollywood sound man and native San Franciscan Michael Evje editorializes: "San Francisco still owns the pipe organ and they own the Palace of Fine Arts. In less than two years, the Exploratorium is moving to the Embarcadero. Why not put the two back together?"



## **NEXT WEDNESDAY'S SPEAKER**

Michael Evje is a San Francisco native whose many interests have literally taken him around the world. Due to an ear infection, he almost lost his hearing at an early age. His mother gave him a small transistor radio to encourage him to hear. Not only did young Mike overcome his ailment, but he fell in love with sound...that elusive yet powerful sense we so often take for granted until age takes it from us. Imagine a life never hearing laughter? His mother's gift really did the trick.

The youngster who loved sound made his first audio tape recording in the seventh grade. By the time he

was eighteen, he was the head soundman for San Francisco's largest film studio and the soundman on the first-ever multi-section news feature in America for Walter Cronkite. He moved to Hollywood and oversaw the sound on movies such as "American Graffiti", "Caddyshack" and Robert De Niro's "Raging Bull". One of the two films he made with Frances Ford Coppola won his sound crew the coveted "British Oscar" for Best Sound. He also did the sound for the directorial movie debuts of Tom Cruise and Mel Gibson.

## **SUNSHINE REPORT**

#### **GLIMPSES FROM OUR PAST**

As we begin the 10th decade of our centennial year, snapshots from our club's archives illustrate the rich history of Sonoma County's first service club: One of our club's first projects was a municipal swimming pool. A single page estimated to be from 1925 reports that future Rotary President (1931-32) George Proctor announced "that the swimming pool was

going good and the concrete would be poured in a few days, expected to have the walls of the pool up in about two weeks.'

A museum and a junior college: On October 2, 1928, our club passed a resolution pledging support to the Luther Burbank Foundation to transform Burbank's home into a museum, creating a botanical garden. The next spring (1929) our club formed a committee to further the interests of the Junior College: "We commend a County Junior College to the earnest consideration of the members of the Rotary Club."

Rotary's battle against polio & hunger: In September of 1931, our club voted to send \$50 to the San Francisco Rotary Club as part of Rotary's contribution to the Crippled Children's Society. That same year, we donated \$25 to the Sonoma County Symphony Orchestra and a motion was passed in October to request the City Council to formulate a definite program for taking care, so far as possible, of the unemployed during the coming fall & winter. The following month, Santa Rosa's council designated an organization for the purpose of looking after the unemployed. The Rotary Club donated \$100 for this purpose.

Rotary purchases an Iron Lung for the County Hospital: In 1937, medicine had no idea what caused poliomyelitis, how it was spread, or how to treat it. The iron lung was a mechanical breathing machine that kept paralyzed children—and adults—alive indefinitely. 20 years later, Dr. Jonas Salk created the first polio vaccine. And Rotary International took on their biggest project ever!
