RECOGNITION FOR ROTARY

When **Don McMillan** was club president, Dr. Shari Shamsavari was a Sonoma State professor, a Rotarian visiting from Guadalajara, and an advocate for the welfare of children here and in Mexico. It was two years ago that she organized the collaborative bi-national cultural exchange program sponsored by our Rotary Club, Sonoma State University, Dr. Shari's Rotary Club, and the Secretary of Education in collaboration with the Secretary of Culture in Guadalajara, which brought to Sonoma County a youth symphony made up of talented children from impoverished backgrounds from Guadalajara.

The youth symphony created a venue for them to perform that enhanced their self-worth and expanded their education opportunities. It brought together the Rotary Clubs to collaborate on a worthwhile cause that brought attention to SSU and

inspired local communities about the sparkling new Green Music Center, plus the project attracted new attention to arts and culture, and the enrichment of our youth. This bi-national cultural exchange was very successful on many fronts. **Past Presidents Don McMillan & Will Haymaker** worked with Jose Guillen on this project which has expanded to 10 U. S. states since 2011.

As the Children's Ambassador for the State of Jalisco, Shari Shamsavari continues to work tirelessly with

the United States and the Mexican government to promote laws for the protection of disadvantaged children, prevention of child abuse and

TODAY'S PROGRAM

With Veterans Day

only a few weeks away—Nov. 11th—former U.S. Army officer **Jim Johnson** focused his introductory remarks on the extraordinary problems facing the young veterans of our military services when they leave combat and return home: "Since the war in Afghanistan began in 2001, there has been an average of one suicide every 36 hours in the U. S. Armed Forces. In 2011, one out of every five of all active duty deaths was suicide. In recent wars, suicide was the second highest cause of death. From 2005 to 2009 alone, more than 1,100 soldiers killed themselves. I will not give you the reasons or what might be a solution to these deaths. I want you to grasp what these statistics mean in human life."

Using a video clip from a documentary that premiered this month at the Santa Rosa Film Festival

and in June the Seattle Film Festival, Jim introduced us to 23-year-old Army Private Steve Camposan, who described his months in Iraqi combat and his years in therapy for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. *The Long Ride Home* was generated by a pledge made by one G. I. to his buddy in Iraq that, "If anything happens to me, promise me that you will take care of my young daughter and her mother." Jim introduced guest speaker Herb Williams, the father of SSgt. Jesse Williams, who was killed in Iraq by a sniper's bullet five years ago. Herb talked with love and emotion about his hero son, killed in action and honored last year by Army buddy Kevin Mincio's ride from Jesse's grave in Santa Rosa cemetery and a commemorative ride across the width of the United States to

New York City arriving—92 days & 4200 miles later—at Ground Zero on the 10th anniversary of 9/11.

That long ride across America was the basis and the initial source of funds

for the non-profit "Team Jesse Foundation". The Foundation uses the funds they raise to take care of the families of the "Fallen Warriors"...the "Tip of America's Spear' who fight our wars on the orders of the politicians. Starting in January, the documentary, *The Long Ride Home*, will be shown in all of the communities visited last year by the Ride in a major fund drive by the Team Jesse Foundation.
