

listened to our resident Francophile relieve his teen years (after 29 years) and talk about their remarkable experiences, world-class wines, and magnificent French cuisine, the Flamingo Ballroom was suffused with the green glow of envy and the bright light of fascination as Jeff compared the huge differences between France and California's wine country.

POLIO PLUS UPDATE

Two weeks ago on his visit to our Rotary Club, District Governor Michael Juric talked about our remarkable progress towards completing Goal #1 of our Rotary Foundation: The Eradication of Polio Worldwide. This week Larry Myers, the District Polio Eradication Chair announced that this year to date only 123 cases of polio exist on Planet Earth—210 cases less than last year to date, with only 118 cases in three endemic countries (Nigeria, Pakistan & Afghanistan) and only five cases in the nonendemic country of Chad. and our worldwide healthcare partners. Almost three times as many cases this year vs. 25 cases YTD. In Nigeria, insecurity in the northern states and concerns of crossborder transmission of the virus into neighboring Niger is a high priority. Immunization-Plus is scheduled to reach nomadic populations in ten northern states. Niger and other West Africa nations will be included in a multi-country campaign scheduled for October & November. In Pakistan, cases are fewer than last year-to-date-29 vs. 72. Even with continued political turmoil in the North, progress is evident. Primary concern continues to be the continuing presence of positive environmental samples collected in Peshawar, Sindh, and Punjab in July. Immunizations continue in conjunction with Afghanistan, where the figures year-to-date are virtually even at 17 to 13. Remarkably, the two countries continue to work together coordinating immunizations even though neither is able to cooperate in other ways.

Chad-Democratic Republic of the Congo-West Africa are on an active immunization schedule to prevent cross border transmission of the polio virus from Nigeria. We must eradicate polio in Nigeria in order to eradicate polio from the African continent.

Polio cases continued to decrease worldwide because of Rotary's efforts and those of our partners—UNICEF, CDC, Gates Foundation, UN Foundation, countries around the world plus both profit and non-profit corporations all continue to financially support our worldwide efforts to eradicate polio. From December 2007 through June 2012, the Rotarians of District 5130 raised \$530,490 to meet the Gates matching challenge. Soon, no parent or child will ever again have to fear a morning that a child might wake up, paralyzed with little or no hope for survival. Thanks to Rotary and to our million-plus Rotarians around the world. We may be "this close", but we can never rest until polio has been totally eradicated the world over.
