
























# **Our Mission**

### Half Wild

Preserve Sonoma Valley biodiversity by protecting at least 50% of the land as healthy habitat, through purchase, easement, and agreement

### **Carbon Negative**

Reverse net greenhouse gas emissions in Sonoma Valley from transportation, housing, business, wildlands, and agriculture

### Water Wise

Slow and hold water in the wet season, to reverse groundwater decline and have quality water available for people and streams in the dry season

## **Thriving Land**

Ensure that most of Sonoma Valley's land is managed for multiple benefits, including: biodiversity, water retention, reduced fire risk, carbon sequestration






# **Our Setting**



### **Geographic Statistics:**

- basin area =  $166 \text{ mi}^2$  (106,486 acres)
- peak elevation = 2,730 feet
- length = 25 mi north/south
- width = 5 to 9.8 mi east/west
  - geologically active:
  - active faults, recent volcanism
    diverse soils, slopes, aspects
  - precipitation between 55 and 20 in



- 10,000-12,000 years ago
- Language related to the "Yuki" Nation

Named for the Americanized version of the Spanish word guapo in reference to their brave resistance against the Mexican conquest

By 1855, fewer than 500 Wappo remained According to UC Santa Barbara researchers, the last known Wappo speaker died 16 years ago




## Historical Ecology: Land Use Timeline

Time Period	Land Use Regime	Description
9,000 BC - 1830	Native land management	Fire, herb cultivation, fishing
1823 - 1846	Spanish/Mexican Era	Intense grazing, logging, farming, drainage
1846 - 1880	Early American	Grazing, logging, farming, drainage
1880 - present	American	Agricultural development, quarries, roads, commercial & residential development


