A: It started as a harvest celebration in 1855 and grew to the Fair we know today.

The first recorded Fair in Sonoma County's history was a single-day event held in front of courthouse in Santa Rosa in October 1855.

The first fairs were organized by the "Sonoma County Agricultural Society


These fairs were held in different locations over the next few years--Healdsburg (1859), Petaluma (1860), Santa Rosa (1861) and Sonoma (1862).



In 1880, the Fair boasted attendance by President Rutherford B. Hayes, General William T. Sherman, secretary of war Alexander Ramsey, and Governor George C. Perkins.

The Sonoma County Fair and Exposition

- Non-Profit Designation
- Governed by a Board of Directors Appointed by County Supervisors
- 10 day Annual fair and 355 days of Expositions.





Fairs in California



- The generic term of "fairs" refers to District Agricultural Associations (DAA's), county fairs, citrus fairs, and the California State Fair.
- The network of California fairs includes 80 fair organizations divided into four categories (the latter three are non-DAA organizations):
 - 1. 54 DAA's a state government entity, 2 DAA's were deactivated during fiscal year 1997/98, leaving 52 active DAA's
 - 2. 23 county fairs County government or not-for-profit organizations
 - 3. 2 citrus fruit fairs not-for-profit organizations
 - 4. The California Exposition and State Fair (Cal Expo) a state agency









Challenges We Face

- The Fair is the Cultural Bridge Educating Urban Populations and Agriculture.












- Chickens Need Roosters to Lay Eggs.

- Food at grocery stores is grown locally.








Activism Feeds on Ignorance

- BOTTOM: A doctored image of Dairy Cows trudging in mud, their bellies and tails are clean though.






